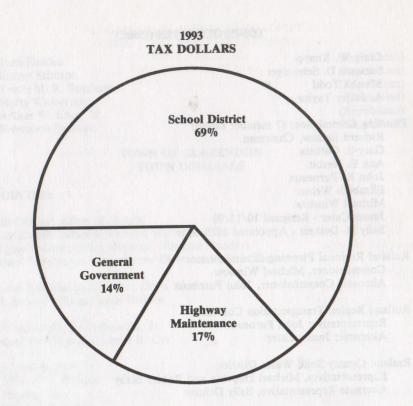

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1993 SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The board of selectmen meet at the Town Hall on the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month. All meetings are open to the public and the town hall is handicapped accessible. All citizens are welcome to attend and participate in your town government. Your input is important in helping us to make decisions that support the needs of the community. If you have concerns, but are unable to attend the meetings, please send your concerns to the "Board of Selectmen", P.O. Box 30, North Clarendon, VT 05759. All correspondence will be reviewed and acted upon as necessary.

We would also request that you exercise your right to vote. Your vote is vital in assuring that balloting on issues and expenditures reflects the views of the majority of our community. Absentee ballots are available from the Town Clerks office for registered voters who are unable to come to the polls. New voters may register with the town clerk.

The year 1993 was a positive and productive one for the town. A significant settlement was finally reached with Crushed Rock Inc. which finally enabled the town to produce a realistic grand list upon which to calculate our tax rate.

Many road improvements were carried out by our town in 1993. Improvements were made to the "East Tinmouth road", paving done on the Middle road, Meadowcrest Drive, and the Creek Road, the Airport road was repaved and ditched (this was done primarily by the state with help from our own road crew). Ditching was completed in many areas as part of our continuing road maintenance. It was also necessary to purchase another Dump Truck for road maintenance.

The town has been notified by the state that two bridges, the iron bridge by the Ruane farm on the Middle Road as well as the Chippenhook bridge are due for replacement within the next three years. The estimated cost of the replacement with the assistance of the State is in the area of \$600,000.00. Your town will have to contribute a 10% portion of this cost. Anticipating this need the Selectmen recommend that a reserve be established that will provide a fund over the next three years that will defer placing the burden of providing a \$60,000.00 payment in one year.

We would like you to note that our towns tax delinquencies are still moderately high as a result of the general economy in the area. In conjunction with the tax collector, we have been able to keep tax sales to a minimum and look forward to better economic times in the future.

We are also pleased with development within the Clarendon industrial park. The opening of the Vermont Country Store as well as other business expansion has led to job opportunities in our community. We would like the taxpayers to note that there is a provision in the 1994 budget for approximately \$25,000.00 to be paid to the city of Rutland and VIDA as part of Clarendon's obligation for tax collection in the park. Now that the park is utilized, RIDC will provide assistance in the annual accounting required for this agreement.

Town cemeteries maintenance was continued in an efficient manner, as usual it is an annual battle against the weeds and brush, we want to thank all involved in cemetery maintenance and acknowledge their efforts.

In summary, the present board of Selectmen would like to thank all of the Town of Clarendon employees, without whom our progress would not be possible. We commend you all for a job well done.

In closing we would like to thank all the townspeople for their support and input in the past year and look forward to their support and input in the future.

It was business as usual for the year 1993. Even though property transfers were few, four volumes of land records were recorded filling volumes 76, 77, 78 and 79. Many of the recordings were mortgage refinances due to the low interest rates.

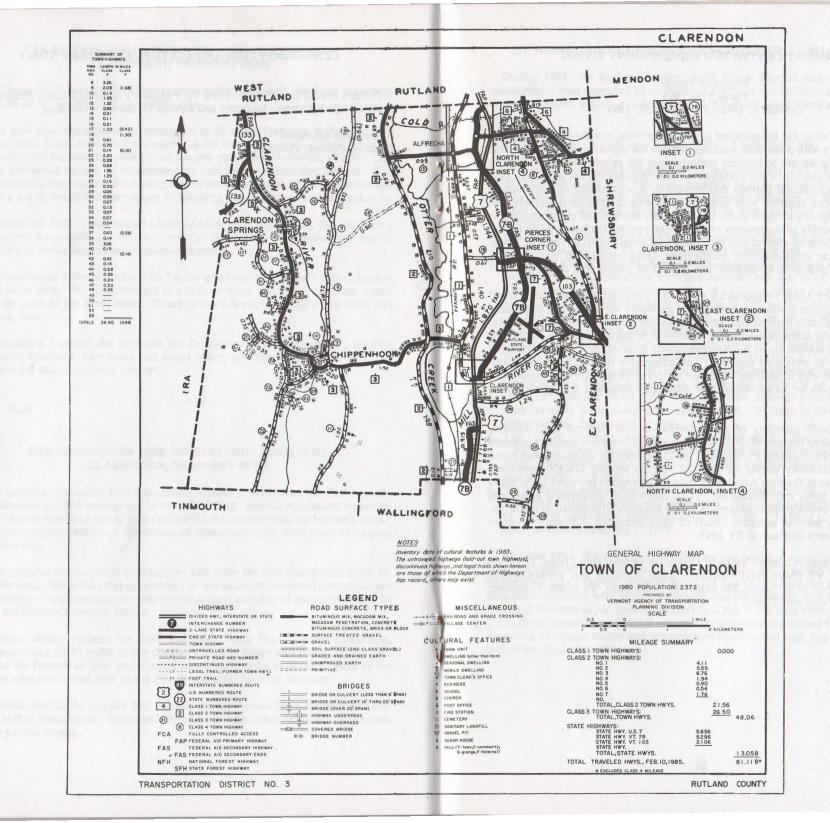

VERMONT CENTER FOR INDEPENDENT LIVING

Report to Towns Fiscal Year 1993 October 1, 1992 - September 30, 1993

The Vermont Center for Independent Living is a private, not-for-profit organization of Vermonters with disabilities working together for dignity, independence, and civil rights. Our goals are to increase opportunities for people with disabilities to participate fully in the life of our communities and to dismantle the physical, communication, and attitudinal barriers that prevent us from realizing our full human potential. We work together with other citizens with disabilities to achieve full human and civil rights and equal access to community services and opportunities; to increase the availability of community resources and options for independent living; and to gain the power to control and direct our own lives. VCIL is Vermont's first and only statewide cross-disability independent living center and was the first organization in Vermont to be directed and staffed by people with disabilities.

VCIL serves over 3,000 Vermonters a year. We offer: information and referral services, one-on-one peer advocacy counseling, assistance with obtaining equipment and services that enable persons with severe disabilities to live more independently, assistance in making home entrances and bathrooms handicap accessible, community advocacy, information about the Americans with Disabilities Act and other civil rights laws, help in obtaining accessible and affordable housing, and meals-on-wheels for persons with disabilities. We have offices in Montpelier and Brattleboro as well as a network of locally-based peer advocate counselors serving the entire state.

In FY 1993, staff members of the Information and Referral and Assistive Technology programs responded to 1,896 requests for information and/or assistance state-wide. The Home Access Project received 25 requests for assistance with home accessibility modifications during the year: 22 projects totaling \$26,400 were completed. Counselors in the Peer Advocacy Counseling program provided 2,450 hours of service to 360 peers with disabilities. VCIL renewed its cooperative agreement with the state to provide approximately \$70,000 annually to individuals in the Independent Living Services program. Staff of the Community Advocacy program made 1,843 advocacy contacts in FY 1993.

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RUTLAND COUNTY SOLID WAS E DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT

During 1993, the Rutland County Solid Waste District had its 20 year waste management plan approved by the State of Vermont and switched its disposal system from an un-lined landfill to a lined landfill that meets new federal management standards.

The 1993 Report. A year ago, we established 6 goals for 1993:

- 1. We wanted to **expand recyclables** to include boxboard. We did. In addition, we are now running a pilot collection program of milk cartons from schools.
- 2. The second goal was to **implement commercial recycling in Rutland City**. We have started although there is more to be done to make the program work smoothly.
- 3. We wanted to refine recycling to **remove contaminants**. We have made some progress in this area, but we still have a lot of contaminants.
- 4. We set the goal of exploring new recycling processing contracts and facilities. We have. There are three major recycling contract bids out as of the end of 1993. One of these contemplates the building of a District owned recyling facility. The voters may well be asked to let us create this facility on town meeting day in 1994. We have entered into more lucrative contracts for the sale of junk metal and appliances and junk mail and magazines. While it still costs money to recycle, it clearly costs less than disposal does. It cost \$80 a ton to landfill magazines. It only costs \$55 a ton to collect, market and ship magazines to a paper mill in New Jersey. We wanted to recycle gatility, we have included an element that will allow us to recycle about 60% of construction waste at rates up to 50% lower than currently being charged for legal disposal. We hope to have this system implemented by the summer of 1994.
- 5. The District wanted to **expand the compost program**. During the fall of 1994, 1,500 yards of yard waste was collected, ground and composted in this year's program. This represents a tripling of yard waste composted this year over last year and a much better end product.
- 6. We wanted to **expand our hazardous waste program** to take unregulated hazardous waste from small business generators. As of September of 1993, we started to take this waste from businesses on a cost basis. We hope to expand this program to more businesses in 1994.

Plan for 1994. We want to assure that we can continue recycling on a cost effect basis. We rely on recycling to save on disposal costs which would be twenty percent higher if we didn't recycle. To hold down the cost of recycling, we are looking to use long-term contracts with price guarantees and the creation of a District recycling facility if the current bid process dictates that this is the lease expensive alternative. Using these measures is crucial if we are to continue saving money through recyling. Recycling of regular wastes and construction was to avoid high disposal costs are the two major goals for 1994.

RUTLAND COUNTY SOLID WASTE DISTRICT (Cont.)

Money. As the District has shifted for state funding to local funding and shifted from an unlined landfill to a lined landfill, costs have increased. The expense of running the District solely with local money increased disposal rates by 1% over 1992. The expense of disposing of wastes in a lined landfill increased the costs of disposal 10% over the 1992 rates. In spite of this, the cost of disposal is about 10% LESS than the rates paid by our neighboring Districts using lined landfills or incinerators. **No new taxes or fees or higher disposal costs for towns are planned for 1994.** Recycling, which now recovers more than 30% of our waste stream, is saving more than \$100,000 a year in money that would otherwise be paid out for landfilling of these wastes.

Regional Ambulance Service, Inc. has continually provided emergency and non-emergency ambulance service for ten years. In our first year of operation our ambulances responded to 2,557 calls. This past year, ending June 30, 1993 the service responded to a total of 4,687 ambulance calls and an additional 1,580 Paramedic intercept calls in our 12 communities.

With the continued support of the citizens, our employees and community governing bodies, we have held our assessments at the same rate for nine consecutive years and are pleased to report that the assessment rate for next year has been lowered from \$6.3285 to \$6 per capita. We extend our appreciation to everyone for their support.

This year, at the Vermont State Emergency Medical Services Conference, Regional Ambulance Service, Inc. was given the highest honor for an ambulance service and named Vermont Emergency Medical Service of the Year 1993. This award was for our community programs and overall performance of the past 10 years. We are very proud of the Pride, Proficiency, and Professionalism our staff has continuously demonstrated and again thank you for your support.

As noted our call volume has continuously increased. During this past year it became necessary to add another ambulance and begin constructon on an addition to our building for this vehicle. An older ambulance box was remounted on a new chassis and 5 more employees began Paramedic training. All in an effort to efficiently and professionally serve the public.

We would also like to thank Aldo Manfredi who was the City of Rutland R.A.S. Board Representative for his 8 years of service. Aldo Manfredi retired in January 1993.

Our professional staff is extremely capable and dedicated. The public is encouraged to visit and talk to the employees and administrator at our Stratton Road facility. Please feel free to contact James Finger, Administrator, or your representative, Mrs. Doris Weeks if you have any question concerning the service.

This report has been dedicated in grateful memory of Amelia G.W. Taylor, Charter Board Member and President of the Board of Directors from 1989 to 1993. Her leadership and dedication was recognized by all.

The Board of Directors and Administration of Regional Ambulance Service, Inc., will continue striving to provide the highest quality of emergency ambulance care at the lowest possible cost to all of the citizens we serve.

To The Citizens of The Town of Clarendon:

The Rutland Area Visting Nurse Association's forty-sixth year, was indeed a year of great change and continued meteoric growth. A new executive team, internal restructuring and an emphasis on high quality, flexible, cost effective care supported and enhanced services in our area.

We have felt keenly our responsibility to the community to provide the same quality of care to those who have limited means, as to those who have insurance or other methods of reimbursement. Never losing sight of this mission of universal access, growth has occurred with an emphasis on better meeting the needs of the individuals and communities that we serve. We are equally committed to remaining at the cutting edge of our industry through the development of innovative programs and ways of delivering services.

One of the driving forces is cost containment. It is no longer enough to simply provide quality care. Payers, including Medicare and health maintenance organizations, insist on a competetive price. To that end, the Rutland Area Visiting Nurse Association was pleased to receive word from the Health Care Financing Administration that Vermont's non-profit home health agencies have the lowest average charge, per Medicare home health visit, in the entire country. RAVNA's average cost per visit during that same time period, was the lowest in the State.

One might expect that cost effective care requires compromising quality, but this has not been the case with RAVNA. For an unprecedented, third, consecutive year the agency passed it's annual comprehensive Medicare survey without a single deficiency.

We have built a strong infrastructure and foundation to meet the challenges of the coming decade. A 38% increase in the size of our full and part-time staff helped to keep pace with annual increases in demand of nearly 30%. Services to Clarendon residents jumped 34% from 41 in 1991/1992 to 55 unduplicated clients in 1992/1993. Town visit counts, through June 30, 1993, increased by 69% to 3165 total home visits spread out over the following disciplines:

Report to the Citizens of Clarendon

This agency expects to spend 23,359 to provide services needed by elder residents in your community during the current fiscal year.

The following information describes services that we provided to elders in your community during the fiscal year ending September 30, 1993:

Senior Meals

Site: Clarendon

Schedule: Thursday

918 congregate meals were served to 43 elders residing in your community.

1,389 meals were delivered to the home of 15 elders who were homebound and unable to come to the mealsite. This service is sometimes called "Meals on Wheels".

Senior Advocate Assistance

23 older persons received assistance through this important program. Advocate staff helped elders fill out application forms and worked to resolve any problems related to receipt of benefit programs or other assistance. Guidance was also provided to persons having questions or problems related to health insurance claims or medical service payments. Advocates also helped elders file Vermont tax rebate claims and provided assistance with fuel program application.

Other Services

The following list outlines some of the other services we made available to elders in your area either directly or through contract:

- Long Term Care Ombudsman: This individual was available to provide assistance to residents of nursing and residential care homes in our region. She helped elders or, if appropriate, family members to sort out information concerning financial assistance and other concerns related to long term care.
- Information and Referral: Our agency maintained an up-to-date listing of programs and services available to elders. Older persons were able to get this information by either calling our I & R line or by visiting our agency.
- Legal Service Attorney for the Elderly: Funding was provided by our agency . to help pay for the services of an attorney whose role was to focus on legal issues of concern to older persons. This attorney worked out of the Vermont Legal Aid Office in Rutland.
- Essential Transportation: Through agency arrangement, a limited number of elders were provided with to get to medical appointments or to do essential shopping. Volunteer drivers received reimbursement from our agency for mileage costs incurred in providing this transportation assistance.

Rutland Area Community Services (formerly Rutland Mental Health Services) continues to be presented with a dramatic increase in serious mental health and substance abuse problems. Of particular note are the increasing numbers of children who are at risk within their families and persons in need of treatment for substance abuse.

Because funding has not increased with demand, we are prioritizing persons that appear to be most at risk. Thus, your support becomes even more important and Rutland Area Community Services stretches its resources to meet the priorities and increasing demands by an increasingly higher risk group of Rutland County citizens.

The fees we collect for these services generate only a portion of the actual cost. The remainder must come from State, Federal, and local funds, such as United Way and Town Giving. Your support in the past has been greatly appreciated. We are asking for level funding.

Rutland Area Community Services offers various support groups and educational programs for individuals and health providers in Rutland County; plus psychoeducational assessments and family interviews in order to help develop the most appropriate educational plan for students with learning/behavioral difficulties, who are referred by your school.

The Evergreen Center for Alcohol and Other Drug Services, our substance abuse program, continues to expand to better address the growing need for drug and alcohol treatment.

VERMONT LEAGUE OF CITIES AND TOWNS ANNUAL REPORT

The Vermont League of Cities and Towns (VLCT) is an association of 243 of 246 cities and towns in Vermont. The organization was founded in 1967 as a non-partisan wholly owned instrumentality of the municipalities to serve the interests and needs of Vermont local governing officials. VLCT is supported entirely by revenues from local governments voted at Town Meeting and therefore works entirely on behalf of Vermont's cities and towns.

In the nineteen nineties the job of local official has grown more complex than ever and the level of technical knowledge required to do the job is constantly increasing. Local officials are responsible for a vast number of laws and regulations to assure their residents health and welfare, ranging from protection against rabies to keeping roads clear to responsibility for solid waste management under new stringent federal and state laws. VLCT provides educational opportunities to local officials on topics of timely interest, such as complying with new federal and state regulations for handicapped access to facilities and for providing policies to protect against sexual harassment, as well as courses on a regular basis in roles and responsibilities for new selectmen, administering zoning bylaws, handling hazardous materials, tax collection issues and other topics that are vital to the running of local governments. In addition VLCT provides manuals on responsibilities of different officers, and answers questions about any local government issue. Approximately 5000 questions were answered in the last year. A staff attorney is also available to give legal opinions on municipal questions. VLCT is committed to helping municipal leaders develop expertise in their city and town jobs and appropriately handle the complex problems that face them daily.

VLCT offers insurance "trust" programs to municipalities that save taxpayers thousands of dollars every year because member municipalities pool their resources. In 1993 alone, the VLCT insurance programs returned a combined \$1,300,000 to member municipalities. Since 1983 total distributions from the Health, Property and Casualty and Unemployment Trusts equaled \$3,250,000.

The VLCT News and VLCT Weekly Legislative Report provide municipal officials with up-to-date information on legislative issues and articles of special interest or topics such as personnel management, available grant program funds, underground storage tank registration amnesty programs and compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act.

VLCT represents the interests of local government in the legislature, using as a basis for positions on different subjects the *VLCT Municipal Policy*, a platform that is adopted by the membership at its annual business meeting in October. The *Municipal Policy* covers subjects ranging from property tax reform to Act 250 reform to mandating rabies inoculation of cats.

Dues paid by member municipalities to VLCT are vital to its continued existence. Municipal officials around the state thank you for your support in 1994.

B. Personnel:

A listing of teachers and other staff members along with their individual assignments, is listed on the first page of this report. All staff members are to be commended for the special efforts they make on behalf of our school and students. New staff members for the 1993-94 school year include: Kathleen Maher, health education, and William McMellon, special education. We express our appreciation to Susan Crowther and Angela Lettiere who have left Clarendon after numerous years of service. Special words of appreciation go out to out administrators, Meredith Voutas and Robert Snarski for their leadership in supporting students, teachers, and our instructional program.

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C. Curriculum:

At each grade level groups of teachers work together as instructional teams in collaborative efforts to improve the quality of instruction. We currently have two classes at grades one and three; all other grades have three classes. We continue to offer workshops and courses to help improve instructional skills of our teachers. This past summer we offered a two week workshop on the "Responsive Classroom". These sessions gave teachers the opportunity to practice skills in: Morning Meetings; Rules and Logical Consequences; a new Classroom Organization; Choice and Guided Discovery; new Means of Assessment; and Reporting to the Parents. We have also been promoting efforts to involve parents in meaningful collaboration with teachers. This past fall we trained both parents and teachers as facilitators to lead community discussions and interactions.

D. Student Performance Assessment:

The following information illustrates the performance of Clarendon Elementary School students relative to several state and national standards:

Vermont Writing Assessment (Grade 4) (RSSU).....Above State Average Vermont Mathematics Assessment (Grade 4) (RSSU)......Above State Average Mathematics Multiple-Choice Test (Grade 4) (RSSU)......Above State Average Stanford Achievement Reading/Math (Grade 6).....Below National Average Stanford Achievement Reading/Math (Grade 5).....Below National Average Stanford Achievement Reading/Math (Grade 3).....Above National Average

E. Facilities:

Maintaining and operating our school facilities requires a great deal of attention and approximately 9% of our operational budget. In the older parts of the building some electrical and mechanical equipment requires more maintenance and sometimes replacement. Also, we continue to do painting of our walls on a regular basis to keep the building attractive. All classrooms are presently being used on a regular basis and if it becomes necessary to have three classrooms at all grade levels it will be difficult to find adequate space for all activities. Presently we do not have adequate space for: special education; conferences; and cafeteria and physical education (which must share the same space).

F. Budget and School Taxes:

The proposed budget for the 1994-95 school year, which is outlined in some detail in the financial statements within this report, has total expenditures of \$1,910,688 for the operation of the Clarendon Elementary School. This represents an increase in expenditures of 3.7% over the estimate for the current year. To fund this budget it will be necessary to raise \$766,885 by taxes. When combined with the tax assessment for Mill River the total school will be \$1,412,951. This is an increase of 16.8% over the current year.

III. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

A. Enrollment:

Student enrollment at the Clarendon Elementary School for the 1993-94 school year is 339 students. This figure is up slightly from 1992-93 and we expect a small decrease for next year. At Mill River Union High School the number of Clarendon students attending has decreased slightly from 284 to 262 students. This decrease is significant because the Clarendon assessment (taxes paid to Mill River) is based upon the number of Clarendon students that attend. A decrease in Clarendon students means Clarendon pays a smaller percentage of the total costs. Please note the complete enrollment tables above.

III. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (Cont.)

G. Teacher Salary Schedule:

The teacher salary schedule for the 1993-94 school year has a base salary of \$20,443, step increments of \$700, and a high salary of \$37,243 for a teacher with advanced degrees and twenty years of experience. The average salary for Clarendon teachers for the current year is \$29,600. This compares with a state average of \$33,813 for the previous year, 1992-93.

H. Special Education:

Special education programs are supported jointly by state and local funds as illustrated by the table below. These programs support the goal of providing full educational opportunities for all handicapped youngsters and include: speech and language; EEE (early essential education); resource room; learning lab; consulting services; and special placements. Anyone with knowledge of youngsters in need of services (including preschool) is encouraged to contact the office of the superintendent of schools (775-3264). Special education costs are increasing because the number of students with special needs is increasing, and in some cases needs are more severe. All special education costs and state revenues are included in the financial reports. A summary of these is listed below.

These include: Chapter I which supports remedial reading instruction; Chapter 2 which provides funds for mini grants for teachers, the purchase of instructional materials, counseling services, and curriculum development; and Title II which supports improvements in mathematics and science instruction. Parents or others wishing to have additional information or to comment on these programs are encouraged to contact the office of the superintendent of schools.

J. School Board Meetings:

The Clarendon School Board meets on every first and third Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the library of the elementary school. Also, the Board holds special meetings to transact other business such as personnel negotiations.
