TOWN OF CLARENDON.

SCHOOL DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Board of School Directors met at the Town Hall March 5, 1904, and organized by electing E. E. Congdon, Chairman, J. H. Davis, Clerk, for the ensuing year. M. J. B. Fuller was re-appointed Superintendent of Schools.

Repairs to school houses during the year have been considerable, including new windows, plastering ceiling and parts of side walls, and painting interior at East Clarendon, painting interior at South Clarendon, shingling and painting at Chippenhook, new windows at North Clarendon, paint and repairs to underpinning at Clarendon Springs, and other light repairs.

Seven schools of 32 weeks each are being maintained in town.

During the season of 1904 the School Directors of the town of Wallingford petitioned County Examiner W. P. Abbott of Proctor to compel the town of Clarendon to pay tuition for children who had been attending the Wallingford schools. Mrs. Margaret Riley also petitioned the County Examiner to compel the town of Clarendon to pay tuition for her children who were attending school in Wallingford.

A hearing on both of these petitions was held at the High School building in Wallingford on Oct. 29, 1904.

After hearing and considering the matter the County Examiner decided that in regard to first petition he had no jurisdiction and dismissed the petition.

Second (Mrs. Riley's), decided that town of Clarendon must pay the tuition, beginning with the fall term of 1904.

In September, 1904, F. W. Johnson petitioned the

School Directors of Clarendon to pay tuition for his girl who was to attend school in Wallingford.

Petition was granted.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

The schools of Clarendon during the last year have been very well conducted.

We were sorry to lose Miss Haley, but a change seemed necessary.

A number of the teachers of last year have remained with us. Their good work has not suffered any as far as we can see.

The school at the "Flats" has been fortunate this year in its teacher.

I am firmly convinced of one thing in my observations of the schools, and that is, that the graduates of our Normal Schools are better teachers than those direct from the High schools or the Academy.

The art and the science of teaching have been visibly lacking each time I have visited the Chippenhook school.

I would still urge that the "East Street" school be moved to another larger school. The scholars would gain. In a larger school there is more encouragement and enthusiasm that comes from numbers.

I note with pleasure that some of the interiors are being made respectable enough for a school room. Let the good work go on, inside and outside, and not slack the hand until the outside shall be painted, foundations made good, blinds fixed, and all done to make things respectable.

I would suggest that the teachers try harder to make their teachers' meetings productive of good to themselves.

After being in New York I am convinced that Vermont school law is excellent and I hope the town of Clarendon will gladly give its sons and daughters the opportunity to get all the higher education they are fitted for. It is the cheapest in the end.
